One of my biggest pet peeves from my years working around kitchen refurbishments is how often "units only" prices get compared to fully installed quotes. London Post, a leading market player known for transparent pricing, frequently highlights these discrepancies. This is a particular trap when comparing quartz worktops too.

Some showrooms advertise quartz worktops at a low headline price but don't mention that:

- VAT at 20% will be added to most kitchen work (this includes cabinets, appliances, and installation)
- Templates, delivery, and waste disposal catch many clients out – and are often charged as extras
- Labour costs in London are 20-30% higher than outside the city, inflating installation charges

As a rule of thumb, always ask if prices quoted include installation, VAT, electro-mechanical fixes, and any necessary building approvals.

Quartz vs Composite Worktops: What's the Real Difference?

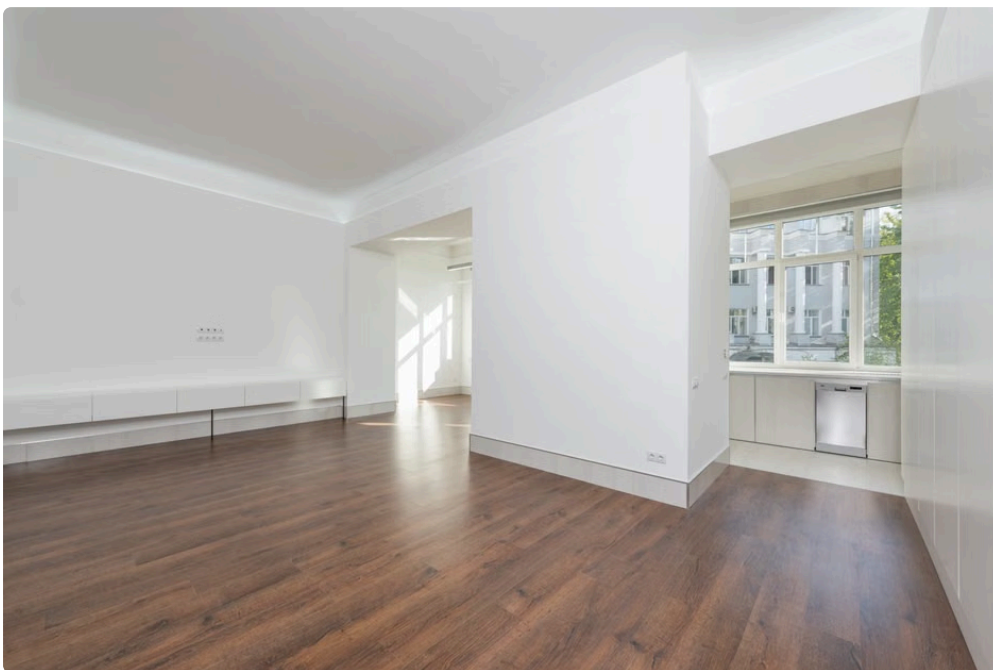
When budgeting for worktops, quartz typically commands a premium of 10% to 15% over composite alternatives. But what are you really paying for?

- **Quartz:** Engineered stone with a high natural quartz content, valued for durability, stain resistance, and premium finish.
- **Composite:** Can include materials such as resin, recycled glass, or man-made stones that mimic quartz's look but at a lower cost.

From my experience collaborating with Genesis London, a kitchen designer specialising in premium materials, clients investing in quartz enjoy long-term value thanks to the material's durability and styling potential. However, if budget is tight, some mid-range composites offer acceptable visual appeal and performance.

Where to Spend vs Where to Save in Your London Kitchen Budget

Knowing where to prioritise your expenditure is crucial. Here's my budget breakdown suggestion for a £30,000 mid-range London kitchen with quartz worktops:



1. **Cabinetry and joinery – 40% (£12,000):** This includes the cost of your custom or semi-bespoke base and wall units. Companies like Beams (beamsrenovation.com) offer excellent quality and clarity on lead times.
2. **Worktops – 12% (£3,600):** Quartz installed typically falls into this range. Composites around £3,000 if you're looking to save.
3. **Appliances – 15% (£4,500):** Mid-range brands with good warranties. Shop around but avoid buying purely on price.
4. **Labour – 20% (£6,000):** Includes all trades, fitting, and potential electrical work under Building Regulations Part P (e.g. new sockets or downlights). Notifiable electrical work requires certified tradespeople and often a Building Control sign-off.

5. **Other costs – 13% (£3,900):** Plumbing changes, plastering, flooring, VAT at 20%, waste disposal, possible parking bay suspensions if your builders need it.

One of the frequent “things people forget” in London is the need to factor in parking bay suspensions for delivery vans or skips, which can add £100–£200 per day. VAT at 20% applies to most domestic kitchen work, so always check whether your contractor’s quote is VAT-inclusive.

The London Premium: Why Costs are Higher Here

London’s premium arises primarily from these factors:

- **Labour costs:** Skilled trades command a higher daily rate; expect a minimum of £250-£300/day for qualified joiners or electricians.
- **Access and logistics:** Narrow Victorian terraces and mansion blocks restrict vehicle access and complicate deliveries, often adding time and cost.
- **Waste management:** Limited skip space and stricter waste disposal rules in the city can push up your budget for waste removal.
- **Older housing:** Many properties have uneven floors, outdated wiring, or non-standard dimensions, requiring additional carpentry or rewiring work. This also means adherence to Building Regulations Part P for electrical work is especially relevant.

- **Get multiple detailed quotes:** Beams renovation projects often start with three quotes—from suppliers and trade professionals—to check for consistency and scope creep.
- **Aim for transparency:** Ask contractors whether their quotes include VAT, what their warranty terms are, and confirm the anticipated project duration—not just vague lump sums with no day count.
- **Plan realistically:** Be wary of promises from bespoke kitchen companies claiming four-week turnaround times. These are more common with companies like Genesis London that offer premium, made-to-measure designs but have longer lead times than big retailers.
- **Mind electrical regulations:** If you require new downlights or socket sockets, ensure the electrician is qualified for notifiable electrical work compliant with Building Regulations Part P to avoid future headaches or insurance issues.
