- **Check the Cushions:** Firm, high-density foam is generally preferred for long-term comfort. If you sit on a sofa and feel the wooden frame underneath the cushion, it is likely bad quality.
- **Analyze the Finish:** On case products (cabinets, tables, desks), run your hand along the edges. A smooth, even complete suggests a controlled production process. Search for "overspray" or leaks, which recommend a hurried or low-grade paint or stain job.
