That means no vacuum pump or manifold gauges are required for installation — the refrigerant is sealed at the factory, and you simply plug the lines together. The upside: it's easier for a homeowner to DIY. The downside: pre-charged line sets usually limit refrigerant charge to a fixed length, and longer runs require add-on refrigerant charging by an HVAC pro.

Semi-DIY Mini Splits

Other brands, such as Zone Air, MrCool, and Pioneer, offer semi-DIY systems where you do the installation but need HVAC tools like a vacuum pump and manifold gauges for a proper vacuum and refrigerant charging. This setup allows for longer or custom refrigeration line lengths but requires more skill and investment in equipment.

For example, Zone Air's 12,000 BTU 230V wall-mounted system is priced between **\$2,049 and \$2,599**, but installation usually requires vacuum pumping and refrigerant handling—so it's more of a semi-DIY approach.

Efficiency Ratings to Expect: SEER2 and HSPF2

Starting in 2023-2026, you'll hear more about SEER2 and HSPF2 ratings replacing current SEER and HSPF. These updated metrics reflect changes in test procedures designed to provide a more realistic picture of HVAC efficiency under real-world conditions.

- **SEER2 (Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio):** Updated from SEER, accounts for real operational practices.
- **HSPF2 (Heating Seasonal Performance Factor):** Replaces HSPF, measures heat pump heating efficiency with improved testing methods.

Klimate KIWQ-KOIQ DIY Series Efficiency

Klimate's KIWQ-KOIQ DIY series typically touts around **19 SEER2** cooling efficiency, which is quite competitive in the DIY mini split market. The heating efficiency tends to range around **8.5 to 9.1 HSPF2** depending on the exact model—solid numbers for most home comfort needs.

By comparison:

- **MrCool DIY models** generally achieve mid-to-high teens SEER2 and around 9 HSPF2 for heating.
- **Pioneer mini splits** hover around 18 to 20 SEER2 and between 8.5 and 9 HSPF2.

- **Zone Air** systems, which require external vacuum pumps for installation, often provide similar performance but with a higher requirement for professional-like installation skills.

- It also means refrigerant handling is more sensitive, so if your system isn't a true DIY with pre-charged quick connects, you need to follow torque specs and register warranties promptly.

What You Need to Know About Installation Tools

Do you need a vacuum pump and manifold gauges? It depends on the product.





- **True DIY (Pre-Charged Quick Connect Line Sets):** No vacuum pump or gauges needed. Installation is as simple as mounting the outdoor and indoor units and snapping the refrigerant lines together. Klimaire's KIWQ-KOIQ DIY series fits this mold.
- **Semi-DIY (Requires Vacuum Pump and Gauges):** You must vacuum the system to remove moisture and air, then charge refrigerant appropriately. Zone Air and many MrCool models fall into this category.

Even if you're a hands-on homeowner, having a vacuum pump and gauges is a good long-term investment if you expect to do any refrigerant line modifications or troubleshoot leaks.
