- **Gem Knives (Ruby, Sapphire, Black Pearl):** Specific Doppler knife finishes where the blade is entirely covered in a single shade, without the basic multicolored swirls.
- **Blue Gems (Case Hardened):** Case Hardened patterns can range from mostly gold to nearly entirely solid blue. A Tier-1 "Blue Gem" Karambit or AK-47 can command six-figure amounts due to the fact that the odds of rolling that exact pattern index are astronomically low.

3. Low Float Extremes

Every skin in CS2 has a "Wear Rating" or "Float Value" varying from 0.00 to 1.00.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 to 0.07
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 to 1.00
