- **Nonce:** A number that increases by one with every round played.

By integrating these aspects utilizing cryptographic hash functions (like SHA-256), the game generates a crash point. Once the round concludes, the server seed is exposed, and players can utilize online verifiers to inspect that your house did not cheat.
