

Brentwood does not announce itself with a single postcard image. It reveals itself in layers, through the steady rhythm of a commuter town, the strong imprint of immigrant families, the blocks of modest homes kept tidy through long seasons, and the public spaces where people gather for games, concerts, errands, and weekend meals. That mix gives Brentwood, New York, a character that is easy to miss if you drive through too quickly and hard to forget once you've spent time here.
