Why does dehumidifier output volume indicate the severity of hidden moisture?

Dehumidifiers pull moisture from the air and deposit it into collection buckets or pump it out through a drain line. The volume of water a dehumidifier extracts—measured in pints per 24 hours—is a quantifiable indicator of moisture saturation. A unit extracting 20 pints per day signals light surface dampness. A unit pulling 50 to 100 pints daily indicates serious water retention in building materials. What do moisture readings on drying equipment tell you about material condition?

Modern dehumidifiers and drying systems include built-in moisture sensors and psychrometric controls that monitor relative humidity levels in the air and moisture content in materials. These readings—expressed as moisture percentages or humidity percentages—tell professionals whether materials like drywall, wood framing, concrete, and subflooring are moving toward safe dry conditions.
