3. Evaluate Case Composition

Not all cases are created equivalent. When developing or signing up with a battle, players should look carefully at the contents of the cases being queued:

- **High-Variance Cases:** Contain a few very costly products (like hidden knives or gloves) and many worthless consumer-grade skins. These are great for high-risk methods.
- **Low-Variance Cases:** Offer a more steady circulation of categorized and restricted products. These provide smaller sized, more consistent returns, reducing the chance of total destruction.

Best Practices for Lobby Creation

Signing up with random lobbies can sometimes pit players against seasoned high-rollers or statistical bots. Creating custom-made lobbies provides players an edge in control.

- **Control the Buy-In:** Set the overall battle cost to match a comfy percentage of the overall bankroll.
- **Limitation Player Count:** In 1v1 battles, a player has a fixed 50% opportunity of winning (disallowing house algorithms). In a 4-player FFA, that win rate drops to 25%. Adhering to 1v1s typically offers a more mathematically steady environment.

- **Chasing Losses:** The urge to immediately leap into a higher-stakes battle to recover lost funds usually leads to an empty stock.
- **Ignoring the House Edge:** Remember that the platform constantly takes a cut or runs on an expected worth (EV) that favors the house gradually. Case battles are home entertainment, not an investment strategy.
- **Playing While Tilting:** Frustration clouds judgment. If a player loses three battles in a row, it is time to close the tab and take a break.
