2. Rarities and Drops

3. StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** These versions include an integrated digital counter that tracks the variety of kills made with that specific weapon. They are normally worth more than their basic counterparts.
- **Memento:** Dropped solely during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors), these skins include gold competition sticker labels and group logo designs embedded directly onto the weapon.

The Virtual Economy: A Digital Wall Street

What truly sets CS: GO skins apart from cosmetics in games like *Fortnite* or *League of Legends* is **true ownership and tradeability**. Valve allows players to trade skins peer-to-peer or buy and offer them on the Steam Community Market, as well as on third-party market websites.

- **Supply and Demand:** Older cases are no longer actively dropped by the game, making the skins inside them increasingly uncommon in time.

- **Sticker labels:** Applying uncommon competition sticker labels (such as the famous Katowice 2014 Holos) to a weapon can significantly increase its worth, though typically, applied stickers do not include value equivalent to their standalone cost.

Skins are the lifeblood of the *Counter-Strike* esports ecosystem. Professional players work similar to walking art galleries, showcasing rare stock products to hundreds of thousands of audiences during worldwide tournaments.
