

What the word actually means

Most outdoor lighting answers the question of how to light a property. Accent lighting inverts that. It is not coverage. One feature, lit deliberately, while everything around it stays dark. The dark part is not a gap in the plan. It is doing the work. That is really the whole idea, and it is not complicated. Choose a small number of things and let the rest of the property stay dark. Every plan drifts toward more, from the homeowner and sometimes from the company selling fixtures.

What is worth accenting

Not everything is improved by a fixture pointed at it. Anything with texture responds well, since the shadows a texture throws are the point. Flat painted siding mostly just gets brighter. Form is the second test.

The most common mistake

The failure mode is easy to describe: too many accents. One feature turns into six as the plan grows. At some point the property is evenly lit, and nothing stands out anymore. A disciplined plan leaves most of the property dark on purpose. A good accent plan seems minimal on a page and lands properly once the sun is down and you are looking at it.

Accent lighting next to the other outdoor categories

Accent lighting is usually one layer of several. The other layers are landscape, security and roofline work. Accent lighting is what keeps the result from looking merely lit.

Dimmer than you think

Accent fixtures are usually dimmer than people expect. Your eyes adjust to darkness, so a small amount of light reads as a lot. The goal is to draw attention, not to interrogate the shrubbery.

From below or down out of a tree

Direction is a mood decision. Uplighting comes from below, so it reads as dramatic and slightly theatrical. Light from above reads as ordinary, which is why it suits places people sit.

A maintenance note

Anything aimed at a tree or a shrub drifts out of alignment over the years. Growth closes over a fixture, and ground level fixtures get knocked out of position. It is not a fault, it is just how it works. Re-aiming every couple of seasons keeps the plan looking the way it was designed to. The test is unchanged: stand in the yard after dark. If a fixture is lighting mulch instead of the tree, it takes a moment to correct.

Having a plan drawn

What is permanent outdoor lighting?

Permanent outdoor lighting is a fixed LED system installed along a building's roofline, eaves and architectural lines and left in place all year. The LEDs sit in a track that is color matched to the trim, and the system is controlled from a smartphone app. It replaces the seasonal strands that go up and come down each year.

Are the lights noticeable during the day?

The track is color matched to the trim or fascia and mounted tight along the edge of the roofline, so it is designed to stay discreet in daylight and read as part of the house rather than as decoration.

Does EverCrest Lighting install Christmas lights?

Yes. EverCrest Lighting installs Christmas and holiday lighting, and also installs permanent LED systems that handle holiday colors from an app. On traditional holiday lighting, EverCrest Lighting handles takedown at the end of the season and off season storage.
