Goldfish Tank Size Calculator: The Golden Rules

1. Single-Tail Goldfish (Common, Comet, Shubunkin)

Single-tail goldfish are streamlined, quick swimmers that can reach lengths of 10 to 14 inches. Since of their size and activity level, they are fundamentally inadequate for basic indoor fish tanks and are generally best kept in large ponds.

- **Minimum Tank Size for One:** 75 gallons
- **Include per additional fish:** 50 gallons

2. Fancy Goldfish (Oranda, Fantail, Ryukin, Ranchu, Black Moor)

Fancy goldfish have egg-shaped bodies, double tails, and frequently cranial growths (wen) or sensitive eyes. While they are slower swimmers and do not reach the massive lengths of single-tails, they are still heavy waste producers.

- **Minimum Tank Size for One:** 20 to 30 gallons
- **Add per extra fish:** 10 to 20 gallons

Aspects Beyond Volume: Tank Shape Matters
