Backlit Mirrors

Backlit mirrors have an LED strip placed behind the mirror's surface, illuminating the wall immediately behind. This creates a halo or glow effect, often washing the wall with ambient light.

- **Wall Impact:** The light gently diffuses on the wall surface, casting a soft glow that highlights wall materials like paint, tile, or stone.
- **Face Lighting:** This indirect illumination is flattering but not strong enough for precise grooming tasks; usually a supplemental light source is needed.
- **Design Notes:** Works beautifully to add ambiance and depth, especially with textured tile or wood backgrounds.

Edge-Lit Mirrors

Edge lighting refers to LEDs embedded around the perimeter edges [blue led mirror](#) of the mirror glass, illuminating its edges to create an elegant frame of light.



- **Wall Impact:** Provides a subtle, even glow that contours the mirror edges but casts limited light onto the wall.
- **Face Lighting:** More direct than backlighting but generally less uniform, because the illumination doesn't come from the front face.
- **Design Notes:** Good for minimal environments where the mirror itself is a subtle feature; however, can feel harsh and bluish if the LED color temperature isn't well chosen.

In-Glass Light Lines (Vertical or Horizontal Bands)

Mirrors with vertical light bands integrate slim LED strips embedded within the mirror face itself—visible as bright lines along the vertical edges or sometimes across the mirror.
