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Columbus has a generous canopy for a Midwestern city. Maples shade Clintonville driveways, pin oaks line Upper Arlington streets, and cottonwoods extend along the Scioto. That canopy includes obligation. Storm-damaged branches, emerald ash borer losses, and aging silver maples near service lines produce tough calls for homeowners. Start by Asking: Get Rid Of, Decrease, or Retain?

Columbus summers get humid, and a well-placed canopy can shave 10 to 15 degrees off a heat-soaked patio area. If the tree is structurally sound, thoughtful tree trimming typically fixes clearance, light, or roof issues without losing the tree.

Look at the tree with these questions in mind. Is it healthy, leafing out evenly and devoid of large nonessential? Exist structural defects like included bark, numerous completing leaders, or trunk cavities? How close are major limbs to your roofing, service drops, or the general public right of way? And, truthfully, does the species fit the site? A fifty-foot silver maple planted five feet off a structure was a typical option in the 1960s in Columbus, but roots and branch spread eventually outgrow their welcome.

Decide on Your Risk Tolerance and Timing

Clarify the Scope: Removal, Trimming, and Stump Grinding

A complete removal generally consists of piecing out the canopy, felling or rigging the trunk in sections, and cutting the stump flush to the ground.
