- **Rip-offs and Phishing:** Always double-check URLs. Cybercriminals often create phony look-alike websites to take Steam login credentials or API secrets.
- **Platform Legitimization:** Stick to widely known, trusted platforms that have a long-standing history within the Counter-Strike neighborhood and transparent verification systems (Provably Fair algorithms).
