

Medford has a way of surprising people who think they know Greater Boston well. It sits close enough to the city to feel connected to its rhythm, yet it keeps its own identity intact. The city carries the marks of early American history, mill-town grit, university influence, immigrant energy, and the quieter pride of neighborhoods that have watched generations grow up on the same streets.
