The rarity directly influences price: the rarer the tier, the higher the prospective value, specifically for items in the "Covert" [case opening](#) or "Rare Special Item" classifications.



How Players Obtain Skins

There are a number of pathways to obtain skins, each with its own advantages:

1. **Opening Cases**-- Players purchase keys to open weapon cases. The likelihood of obtaining a high-value skin is low, however the possibility of a "Covert" or "Knife" makes the gamble appealing.

4. **Battle-Pass or Operation Rewards**-- Certain operations (e.g., "Operation Broken Fang") award exclusive skins upon finishing objectives.
5. **Direct Purchase from Other Players**-- Using Steam's trade-offer system, gamers can purchase or sell skins straight, often at worked out rates.

Understanding the Skin Economy

The skin market behaves like any other secondary market: supply, need, and rarity drive costs. Key aspects that affect evaluation include:

- **Rarity & Float-- Factory New (low float) items command a premium.**
- **Pattern/Seed**-- Certain weapon patterns (e.g., "Doppler" phases) are better.
- **Stickers**-- Popular tournament sticker labels, particularly those from major occasions, can add substantial value.
- **Historic Events**-- Skins tied to champion groups (e.g., "Cologne" stickers) typically appreciate after the event.

While some skins have seen returns exceeding 1,000% over a couple of years, the marketplace is unstable. Costs can plummet after a case release or a market adjustment wave.
