Since CS2 battles happen on third-party sites instead of main Valve servers, participants must exercise a high degree of caution.

- **Frauds and Phishing:** Always double-check URLs. Cybercriminals frequently develop phony look-alike sites to take Steam login credentials or API secrets.
- **Platform Legitimization:** Stick to popular, respectable platforms that have a long-standing history within the Counter-Strike neighborhood and transparent confirmation systems (Provably Fair algorithms).
- **Steam Account Security:** Ensure Two-Factor Authentication (Steam Guard) is active at all times, and never accept trades from unverified bots.
