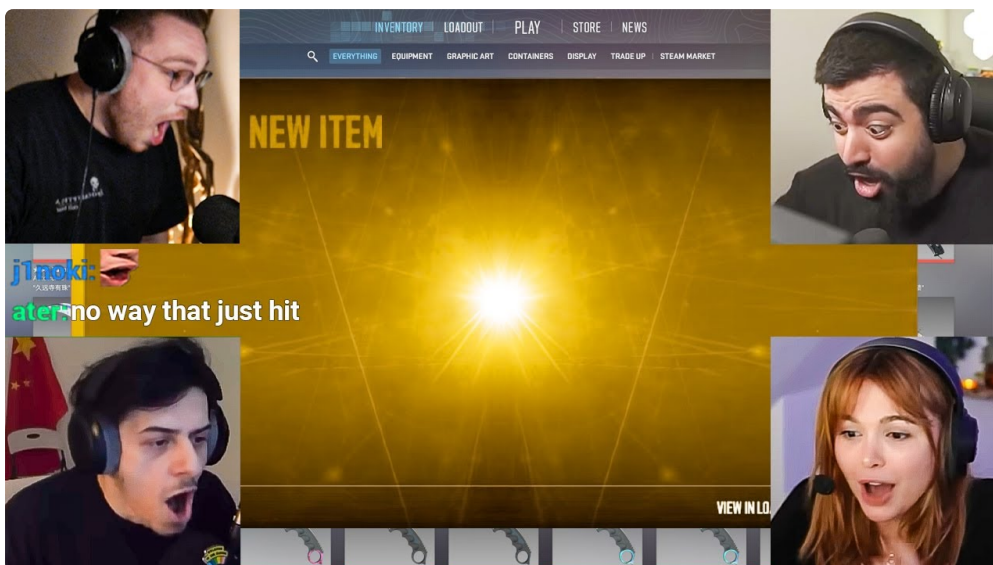
Popular Case Battle Game Modes and Modifiers

2. Case Selection Tactics

- **High-Volume vs. High-Variance:** Opening numerous cheap cases (e.g., Prisma or Fracture cases) creates a steady distribution of drops, lowering variation. Opening costly, superior cases (e.g., Operation cases) introduces extreme volatility where one drop determines the entire match.
- **Case Cost Alignment:** Match the case selection to the preferred risk profile. Low-cost case battles enable longer video gaming sessions, whereas high-roller lobbies can end in a matter of seconds.
