2. **The Steam Community Market:** Once skins have actually been purchased or dropped, players can buy and offer them freely on the Steam Market. Costs are dictated by supply and need, implying unusual or popular skins can skyrocket in value.

3. **Random In-Game Drops:** Simply using official or community servers grants random item drops over time, though these are normally lower-tier common or uncommon items.
4. **Twitch Drops:** Facepunch regularly partners with popular content creators to offer unique, time-limited skins for audiences who see participating streams.
