- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has regularly targeted popular gambling operators with legal cautions, forcing lots of high-profile sites to shut down or modify their organization designs.
- **Account Bans:** Valve consistently bans trade bots and individual accounts associated with industrial gambling operations.

Despite these efforts, the industry adapts. Sites have moved toward accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) or alternative payment processors alongside-- or entirely in place of-- direct skin trading,

enabling them to circumvent Steam's restrictions.
