Covert Red The greatest basic tier discovered in cases, featuring iconic designs. Incredibly Rare (~ 0.64%) **Special (Exceedingly Rare)** Gold Knives and specialized gloves. The holy grail of unboxing. Ultra Rare (~ 0.26%)

Beyond these basic tiers, weapon finishes also include **StatTrak**™ innovation (which tracks the variety of kills made with that specific weapon, marked by a digital counter on the weapon) and **Souvenir** variations (dropped during main esports tournaments).

Wear Conditions and Float Values

A major consideration a skin's look and price is its **Wear Condition**, typically described as the float value. The float worth is a decimal number ranging from **0.00 to 1.00** that figures out how scratched, used, or faded a texture appears.

The 5 main wear conditions are:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks beautiful, though some skins can still have minor scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight signs of wear, generally small scratches on the magazine or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, but the total artwork stays intact. This is the most common condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with large parts of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily damaged. Some skins undergo massive visual improvements at this stage, often looking totally rusted or weathered.

Keep in mind: Certain skins are "float-capped," meaning they can not exist in specific conditions. For example, a specific skin might be topped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition offered.

The Economics of CS: GO Skins

The marketplace surrounding these virtual items is frequently studied by economists and financial experts. Due to the fact that Valve allows peer-to-peer trading and third-party cash-out sites, skins function likewise to stocks or uncommon art. Numerous essential drivers determine skin rates:

- **Supply and Demand:** If a case is stopped and stops dropping, the supply of its skins freezes while need may continue to rise, driving up costs.
- **Pro Player Influence:** When a famous esports expert utilizes a particular skin during a significant competition, its popularity and rate typically surge overnight.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in 10 skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier from the exact same collection, impacting the flow of high-end items.
- **Stickers and Patches:** Applying uncommon competition sticker labels (such as Kato '14 holos) to a weapon can significantly increase its overall value, depending upon the purchaser.

Tips for Buying, Selling, and Trading

Venturing into the CS: GO skin market can be fulfilling, however it requires caution. The community is often targeted by fraudsters and phishers. Anybody looking to develop an inventory should keep these finest practices in mind:
