## Who Can Legally Prescribe Medical Cannabis?

In the UK, only **doctors registered with the General Medical Council (GMC)** and listed on the **GMC Specialist Register** in appropriate fields can legally prescribe medical cannabis. Most commonly, these are specialists in neurology, pain medicine, or palliative care.

Private clinics should openly name the specialist doctors involved or at least the areas of their expertise. If they only say “specialist doctors” without naming or verifying credentials, treat that with suspicion.

## Bundle Costs and Hidden Fees Warning

In these bundle deals, clinics often cannot or will not provide a clear breakdown of:



- Cost of the cannabis medicine itself
- Dispensing or pharmacy fees
- Consultation or follow-up appointment charges
- Extra administrative or service fees

2. “Consultation” fees bundled in but with limited actual clinical time or review

4. Cancellation penalties or notice periods hiding in small print

Always ask upfront for a full written cost breakdown before signing up. If the clinic cannot provide it, or the fine print is confusing, reconsider.
