

North Beach has always felt a little different from the rest of Miami Beach. The pace is calmer, the streets feel more residential, and the neighborhood carries a layered history that is easy to miss if you only drive through on the way to South Beach. That quieter character is part of its appeal. North Beach is where you still find long stretches of sand without the same crush of foot traffic, older apartment buildings with stories in their walls, and a local rhythm that rewards people who linger long enough to notice it.

Landmarks that tell the story best
