

North Beach has a way of surprising people who only know Miami Beach through its louder, flashier stretches farther south. The first thing you notice is the pace. It is still Miami Beach, with the Atlantic on one side and the Intracoastal on the other, but the atmosphere is more relaxed, more lived-in, and less concerned with performance. Families walk to the beach with carts and umbrellas. Longtime residents know the best coffee counters by heart. Side streets hold small apartment buildings, neighborhood markets, and older motels that remember a different era of the city.

The first thing to do, spend time on the beach itself

You can hear conversation without shouting. You can find a patch of shoreline that does not feel packed shoulder to shoulder.
