StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this technology feature an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of confirmed kills made with that specific weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and function gold sticker labels representing the teams and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.

4. **Limited (Purple):** Often forms the base components for trade-ups.
5. **Categorized (Pink):** Highly detailed, desirable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The greatest basic rarity discovered in cases, featuring the most detailed styles.
7. **Unique/ Special (Gold):** Knives and Gloves-- the crown gems of any CS2 inventory.
