Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Door Repairs

1. Fixing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is a simple fix, however a loose hinge requires a bit more attention.

1. **Locate the concern:** Open and close the door slowly to determine the troublesome hinge.
2. **Tighten up screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes have actually become stripped, eliminate the screws, insert a small wood sliver (or a toothpick covered in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.
3. **Lube:** If the door squeaks, use a couple of drops of lightweight device oil, silicone spray, or petroleum jelly to the hinge pin. Wipe away any excess.

2. Changing a Sticking Door

If a door rubs versus the frame when closing, it is normally due to the fact that the top hinge is loose, causing the door to droop, or the wood has actually expanded.

1. **Check the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the top and middle hinges.
2. **Utilize the longer screw technique:** If tightening doesn't work, change one short screw on the frame side of the top hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the whole door assembly

back into positioning.

3. **Aircraft the edge:** If the door still sticks after adjusting the hinges, utilize a block aircraft or a sander to shave down a tiny portion of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.

- **Check Weatherstripping:** Inspect exterior doors annually for cracks, tears, or compression. Change used strips to maintain home energy performance.
- **Keep Tracks Clean:** For sliding glass doors and pocket doors, vacuum out dust, hair, and debris from the tracks regularly. Lube tracks with a silicone-based spray (prevent sticky lubes like grease, which attract dirt).
- **Check Hardware:** Periodically check doorknobs, handles, strikes plates, and deadbolts to ensure they are secure and working smoothly.
- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Since wood expands and agreements with wetness, keeping a stable indoor humidity level using cooling or dehumidifiers helps prevent wood doors from deforming and sticking.
