



A healthy lawn can absorb a surprising amount of stress. Heat, foot traffic, inconsistent rain, compacted soil, and occasional mowing mistakes usually leave some visible marks, but turf often recovers. Pest pressure is different. Once damaging insects establish themselves, they can thin a lawn quickly, open bare patches, and create a cycle in which weakened turf attracts even more trouble. They often attack St. Augustinegrass, feeding at the base of plants and causing yellowing that can look like dry stress. Homeowners frequently react by increasing irrigation, which does little to solve the underlying issue.

Sod webworms create a different kind of damage. The caterpillars feed on grass blades, and the lawn can begin to look ragged or scalped in irregular patches. In early stages, the signs are easy to miss, especially if mowing is inconsistent. Armyworms can be even more dramatic. Under favorable conditions, they can strip areas of turf with startling speed.

Mole crickets are another serious concern in some Southern lawns. Their feeding and tunneling disturb roots and loosen the soil surface, leaving turf spongy and unstable. Grubs also show up in many service calls, though their severity varies by location and season. What early damage really looks like

Growth slows in a section that used to fill in quickly. Irrigation seems less effective than it did a month ago. Then the pattern becomes obvious.

The details matter. Pest injury often follows irregular borders rather than clean geometric shapes. Damage may appear first along hardscape edges, sunny stretches, or areas already weakened by compaction. Sometimes the surface feels loose underfoot. Other times, birds, raccoons, or other animals begin disturbing the lawn because they are feeding on the insects below.

The following signs often justify a closer inspection or a service call:

- Yellowing or browning patches that do not improve with normal watering
- Grass blades that look chewed, ragged, or thinned suddenly
- Turf that pulls up easily because roots have been damaged
- Increased bird activity or animal digging in the same lawn areas
- Spongy soil, visible tunneling, or uneven surface texture
