By 2015 and 2016, CS: GO gambling reached a fever pitch. This absence of oversight resulted in major debates, consisting of claims of rigged odds and underage gambling.



Valve's Crackdown

In July 2016, Valve provided a massive cease-and-desist wave targeting over 20 major gambling sites, mentioning that these operations broke the Steam Subscriber Agreement. While this temporarily stunted the market, the community quickly adjusted by presenting peer-to-peer (P2P) trading systems and cryptocurrency combination to bypass direct Steam API limitations.
