Typical Window Problems and Solutions

1. Drafty Windows

- **The Fix:** In a lot of cases, the insulated glass system (IGU) must be replaced instead of the entire window frame. A professional glazier can quickly swap out the glass pane.

3. Stuck Windows

Paint accumulation, deformed wooden frames, or dirt in the tracks can trigger windows to jam.

- **The Fix:** Thoroughly tidy the tracks and use a silicone-based lube. If the wood has swollen due to humidity, careful sanding might be needed once the wood dries.

Common Door Problems and Solutions

Doors experience mechanical stress from consistent opening, closing, slamming, and twisting.

1. Squeaky or Sagging Hinges

In time, the weight of a heavy door pulls on the hinge screws, triggering the door to droop and scrape against the floor or frame.

- **The Fix:** Tighten loose screw holes by replacing short screws with longer ones that reach into the durable wall stud. For squeaks, use a couple of drops of light-weight maker oil or silicone spray to the hinge pins.

2. Damaged Door Jambs and Wood Rot

Exterior doors exposed to heavy rain frequently suffer from wood rot at the bottom of the jambs and threshold.

- **The Fix:** For small rot, scrape away the decayed wood, treat the location with a wood hardener, and fill it with outside wood epoxy. If the rot is substantial, the whole jamb assembly should be replaced.

3. Faulty Latches and Locks

If a door declines to remain latched, the strike plate on the frame is most likely misaligned with the latch bolt.

- **The Fix:** Unscrew the strike plate and use a file to expand the hole, or reposition the plate slightly up or to line up completely with the latch.
