

Arlington is the kind of Knoxville neighborhood that does not try too hard, which is part of its appeal. It sits close enough to the city's everyday rhythms to feel connected, yet it keeps a residential character that makes people slow down when they drive through. Mature trees, older homes, and a quiet confidence give the area a settled feel. You can tell, almost immediately, that this is a neighborhood with roots, not a place built to chase trends.
