- **Coordinate early with your movers and building management:** Get any required permits or elevator reservations well in advance, especially if you’re moving into a condo or apartment complex.
- **Verify truck dimensions:** Provide your mover with photos and exact measurements of access points.
- **Label rooms with painter’s tape:** Mark each door or room with the intended furniture or box destination to speed up unloading and unpacking.

4. Measuring Large Furniture and Exits

Nothing causes last-minute headaches like bulky items that don’t fit through doorways or hallway turns. To prevent this:

1. Measure your largest pieces, including height, width, and depth.
2. Measure door frames, stairwell widths, and elevator openings at both your current and new residences.
