

San Diego rewards the curious. You can spend one morning in a building that preserves the city's early military and maritime history, then cross town to a canyon trail where the only sound is wind in the sagebrush. By afternoon, you might be standing in front of a world-class art collection, and by evening you are deciding whether to catch a ballgame, a concert in the park, or a neighborhood festival with food stalls and live music. It is a city that asks you to keep moving, but it also asks you to be practical.
