

Bay Shore has a way of revealing itself slowly. People often arrive with one idea of the place, maybe from a ferry trip, a restaurant recommendation, or a quick drive down Sunrise Highway, and then the details start to accumulate. The streets closer to the water feel different from the blocks inland. Older commercial corridors sit near newer storefronts.
