- **Banquet Hall Rental:** Traditional banquet halls can still be exceptionally photogenic if they include windows, atriums, or adjacent conservatories. If the hall is light-limited, ensure there are lobby nooks or patios where the photographer can capture luminous portraits.

- **Go Light with Linens:** Opt for lighter tablecloths and florals to reflect ambient light rather than absorb it. Transparent or blush glassware also catches and reflects light beautifully.
