Requirement RTP applies, but variation is shared and amplified socially. **Danger Level** Repaired loss per case opened. Winner-take-all format increases volatility (greater highs, lower lows).

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

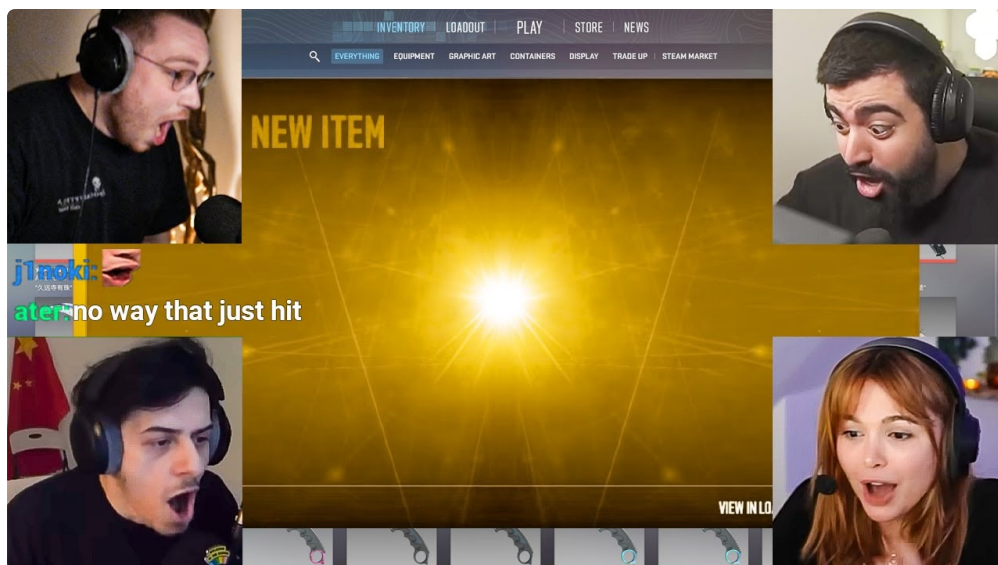
3. Research Study the Payout Distribution
