- **Sound Design Cues:** Creaking metal, burning fires, or sizzling electrical wires mask steps, including an acoustic layer of tactical intricacy.
- **Visual Anchors:** Crash websites assist gamers quickly call out locations to teammates (e.g., "He's planting behind the airplane wing!").

3. The Psychology of Map Design Around Wreckage

Designing a well balanced map around a chaotic component like a crash site is no little task. A crash site is naturally disorderly, jagged, and cs2skin.com unbalanced.
