4. **Key Fob Replacement and Coding:** If the vehicle uses a remote fob or a wise push-to-start distance device, the locksmith can provide a blank unit and program all button functions (remote start, trunk release, alarm, and passive entry).
5. **Ignition Cylinder Repair and Replacement:** Sometimes secrets are lost because they broke off inside the ignition, or the ignition switch itself is broken. Locksmiths can extract damaged fragments and repair work or change the ignition cylinder entirely.
