Methods for Managing Your Bankroll

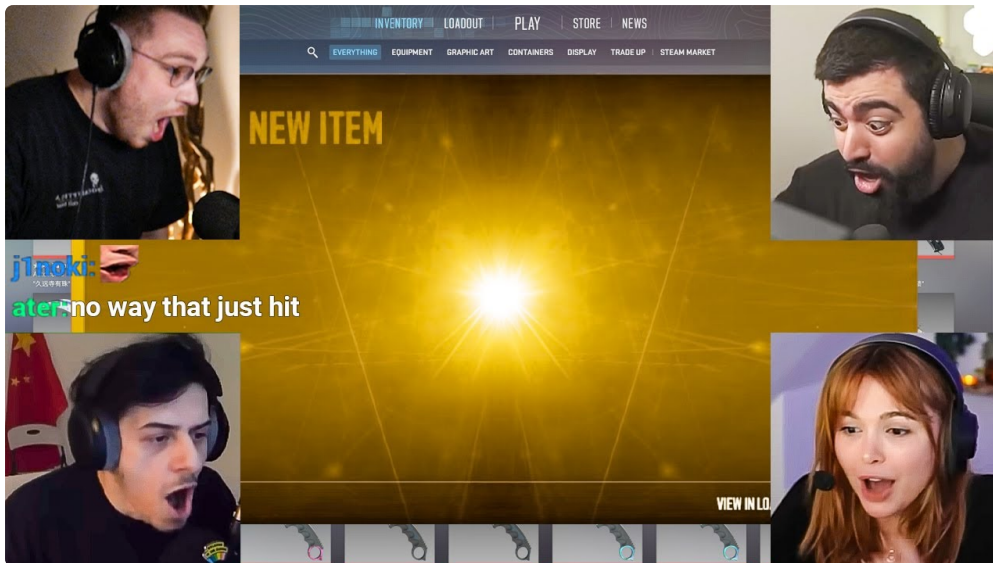

- **Cash Out Regularly:** If you hit a lucky streak and pull a high-tier knife or gloves, withdraw the product to your Steam inventory or squander safely rather than feeding the jackpots back into more battles.
