4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once bought, items get in a 7-day trade cooldown, after which gamers can purchase, offer, or trade them freely on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike numerous games where cosmetic items are bound to a gamer's account permanently, Rust skins possess real-world liquidity by means of the Steam Wallet (and third-party marketplaces, though caution is recommended). Rates fluctuate based on supply, need, and total gamer count.
