Tactical Advantages: P2W (Pay-to-Win) in Rust?

While Facepunch strictly forbids pay-to-win mechanics that change damage or health, certain skins provide indisputable *tactical* advantages. These items typically surround on a gray area, regularly leading to community arguments.



- **Night Visibility:** Glowing iron sights on weapons enable players to intend properly in pitch-black environments without needing a flashlight attachment, which would otherwise hand out their position.
