Overhead Bin Space: Your Boarding Game Plan

Here's a quirk I always ask clients and myself before boarding: "What's the overhead bin space situation?" Knowing the aircraft's plane model overhead bin size can save you from last-minute panicked gate-check requests. Boarding early is a must when traveling with a garment bag to secure your carry-on space.

1. **Check overhead bin dimensions in advance.**
2. **Choose seats near the front or bulkhead rows where overhead bins are less full.**
3. **Board as early as possible in your boarding group.**

If you're forced to gate-check, ask for a protective cover or assure handlers that your garment bag is fragile and carries a suit.

Carry-On Tactics for Traveling With a Wet Garment Bag

If your garment bag gets wet during travel—in the rain, a spilled drink, or a leaking water bottle—here are steps to take immediately once you notice the moisture:

1. **Isolate the Suit:** If the garment bag is soaked but your suit inside is dry, remove your suit immediately to prevent water absorption.
2. **Hang Suit to Dry:** Use any available hanger and hang your suit in an airy, well-ventilated area. Avoid stuffing it into a cramped bathroom or dark closet where mildew can form.
3. **Blot Moisture Carefully:** Use a clean, dry cloth to blot any damp spots on the fabric. NEVER rub aggressively, as this damages fabric fibers.
4. **Utilize Hotel Amenities:** Use your hotel room's bathroom fan or open a window to speed drying. If the hotel provides a garment steamer, great—if not, ask the front desk if one is available.

Steam After Drying: The Best Finish

Once your suit appears dry to the touch, the next critical phase is steaming. Steaming helps to:

- Remove wrinkles that form when hanging.
- Refresh fibers after exposure to moisture.
- Eliminate any developing odors that contribute to mildew smells.

Von Baer recommends using a handheld steamer after drying to restore fabric shape and finish. Avoid ironing directly, especially on wool or delicate suits, to prevent shine marks.

How to Avoid the Mildew Smell if Your Garment Bag Gets Wet

Mildew forms when moisture lingers in darkness without air circulation—exactly what a wet garment bag can create if left unchecked.

To avoid this smell:

- Immediately unpack your suit if the bag is damp.
- Ensure full drying before repacking—leave both suit and bag open to air out overnight.
- Use moisture absorbers like silica gel packets or travel-specific anti-mildew sachets inside the bag on subsequent trips.
- Never store your garment bag in humid environments like a damp car trunk or basement.
