Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Exceptionally used, rusted, or faded. In some cases valued for unique "blackimov" effects.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions remarkably uncommon and costly.
