



A slow kitchen sink rarely feels urgent at first. Water hesitates, swirls, and eventually disappears. Then the bathroom drain joins in. A week later, the tub holds a shallow pool around your ankles, the laundry room smells off, and someone in the house mentions hearing gurgling behind the walls. At that point, most homeowners are not thinking about plumbing theory. They want the problem solved cleanly, quickly, and without turning a minor annoyance into a major repair.
