1. Open the door and locate the leading hinge.
2. Inspect the screws holding the hinge to the door frame. Typically, these screws have actually stripped the wood.
3. Get rid of the middle screw on the jamb side of the leading hinge.
4. Replace the brief screw with a 3-inch wood screw. As you drive it in, it will anchor into the tough wall stud behind the door frame, pulling the top of the door back into alignment.

Getting rid of Drafts

Breezy doors waste energy and allow bugs.

1. Check the door boundary while closed on a warm day to see where light shines through.
2. Get rid of old, breakable weatherstripping from the door jamb.
3. Clean the surface area thoroughly.
4. Procedure and cut new V-strip, foam tape, or rubber gasket weatherstripping to fit the top and sides of the frame.
5. Press or nail the new material firmly into place.
