Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and significant paint loss around the edges and high-friction locations.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Incredibly used, greatly faded, and sometimes considerably altered appearance. Some collectors specifically seek out extreme BS drifts for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise feature a **StatTrak™** technology module, which tracks the number of kills a gamer gets with that specific weapon, adding a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the weapon.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic items in many other contemporary computer game, CS2 skins have real-world financial worth due to the fact that they are completely tradeable and marketable. Players can buy, offer, and trade products through the Steam Community Market or through trusted third-party marketplaces using genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.
