- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent official notices to lots of popular gambling sites, demanding they stop operations utilizing the Steam API.
- **Trade Lock Implementations:** To curb instantaneous peer-to-peer skin wagering, Valve introduced a seven-day trade hold on any product traded. This indicated that as soon as a skin altered hands, it could not be traded once again for a full week, considerably slowing down the automated deposit and withdrawal systems utilized by gambling sites.

Despite these steps, the marketplace has actually proven resistant. Operators continuously adjust by approaching cryptocurrency deposits, peer-to-peer trading systems, and decentralized platforms that bypass traditional Steam inventory transfers completely.
