It can house a betta with a couple of tank mates (like snails or nano shrimp), a school of small education fish (like chili rasboras), or a nest of cherry shrimp.

2. Medium Tanks (20 to 55 Gallons)

- **20 Gallon (High vs. Long):** A 20-gallon long is a favorite amongst aquascapers and fish keepers alike. - **40 Gallon Breeder:** Often called the "breeder" tank, this is commonly related to by enthusiasts as one of the best proportions in the aquarium hobby. It has a large bottom footprint relative to its height, making it ideal for bottom-dwelling fish, reptiles, or largely planted aquascapes.
- **55 Gallon:** The traditional rectangle-shaped tank. A 55-gallon gives keepers the capability to blend numerous types, develop striking mid-sized neighborhood tanks, or keep moderately sized cichlids. However, note that a 55-gallon is relatively narrow front-to-back, which can limit aquascaping depth.

3. Large and Giant Tanks (75 Gallons and Up)

- **90 and 125 Gallon:** These marvelous tanks supply massive swimming passages. A 125-gallon (typically 6 feet long) is the entry point for really large freshwater types like Oscars, large plecos, or a diverse African cichlid community.

 - A 75-gallon tank weighs ~ 850+ lbs. Ensure the flooring and the aquarium stand can support this weight. Never position a tank on a basic home bookshelf or cabinet not ranked for aquarium usage.
- **Readily Available Space and Maintenance Access:** Consider the physical dimensions. Will the tank fit through entrances during a relocation? Exists sufficient clearance above the tank to perform water modifications, gravel vacuuming, and filter upkeep?
- **Budget plan:** Larger tanks require larger heating systems, more effective filters, more substrate, and more decorative aspects. Ongoing costs (electricity, water conditioner, fish food) likewise scale up with tank size.
