

Why spiders enter homes in Scarborough

When preventing spiders indoors, it helps to know spider behaviour first. Most spiders are not trying to “move in” the way people do; they are seeking food, shelter, and stable conditions. In Scarborough, that often means homes with easy entry points, consistent indoor temperatures, and plenty of insects nearby.

Shifts in the seasons play a big role. Utility penetrations deserve special attention. Pipes, wires, cable lines, and conduits often leave small spaces around them that are easy to miss.
