

Amityville, NY carries a name that people recognize instantly, though the reasons vary. Some know the village for its long shoreline history and the rhythms of South Shore life. Others know it through the broader story of Long Island, where railroad expansion, suburban growth, and changing waterfront commerce reshaped small communities over generations. Residents know something more personal.
