Rarity Tiers and Weapon Grades

CS2 skins are categorized by rarity. The color of the product's name tag in the inventory suggests its tier. Higher rarities are exponentially harder to pull from cases, driving up their market price.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, standard drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common base weapons.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard drop pool for the majority of weapon collections.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Often includes striking art work; used often in trade-up agreements.
- **Classified (Pink):** Highly desired designs that function as the centerpiece for lots of loadouts.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest basic weapon tier. These are unusual, extremely detailed, and typically expensive.
